Investigating academic, music, press, and fan-based responses, Glynn argues that the Modyssey enacted in Quadrophenia intrigues because it opens a hermetic subculture to its socialrealist context; it enriches because it is a cult film that dares to explore the dangers in being part of a cult; it endures because of its emotional honesty, showing Jimmy as failing, with family, job, girl, and group; it excites because we all know that, at some point in our lives, I was there!.
